## What to expect this holiday season

As we approach the most important day in our religious calendar, there is much going on in the Kirk family. Here's a roundup of things we believe you need to know:

• To safeguard our members' health, our traditional Christmas Eve service will not take place "in-person" this year.

Instead, we will offer a video of our traditional Lessons and Carols so you can hear the story, sing the old, familiar hymns, and welcome the Christ-child in the comfort of your own home.

• At the urging of state health experts, the Session has adopted new mask guidelines for those attending Saturday and Sunday services. Until the pandemic eases, we are urging members to put their masks on before leaving your car. Leave them on until you return to your

- Advent began on Nov. 29. It is a time for reflection on the gift of God in Christ. Here are three online

resources for your advent scripture reading, contemplation, and prayer.

#### 1. Luther Seminary Advent Devotional 2020

This is a series of short daily advent devotionals to use between Nov. 29 and Dec. 25. They are short reflections on scripture and on the Paul Gerhardt hymn text O Lord How Shall I Meet You, followed by a prayer.

The reflections probe the nature of the incarnation coming as it does at this season and daily in the life of believers.

#### 2. Daily Readings-Presbyterian Church USA

We featured the D365 daily readings in a previous newsletter. These reflections, posted by the PC(USA), continue through the advent season and encourage us to pause, listen (scripture), think (devotional reflections), pray, and go forward as we encounter Christ's advent in the world

#### 3. Singing Our Advent Joy

This year's advent devotionals from the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary are a truly unique gift.

They provide devotional reflections on scripture and hymns and carols from "hymnals used for worship in Shelton Chapel at Austin Seminary: Glory to God, The United Methodist Hymnal, African-American Heritage Hymnal, and Santo Santo Santo."

The texts of these familiar and unfamiliar songs are curated and presented by Eric Wall, assistant professor of sacred music at the seminary. The contributors encourage us to "sing together with great joy, even as we are apart!"

We hope you have a wonderful and blessed Christmas season.

## The new year is already here, so let's celebrate

Happy New Year!

This may seem a little early, but it is a reminder our new church year begins this Nov. 29. Unlike our secular calendars, which begin Jan. 1, the liturgical church calendar begins with the season of Advent, which means "coming."

The Church has set aside four weeks for the season of Advent calling us to prepare our hearts for God's coming – both as we prepare to celebrate Christ's birth on that first Christmas as well as we look for Christ's coming in our world today.

Christmas certainly celebrates one of the great mysteries of our faith.

As the gospel writer John puts it: "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us." The incarnation of God's Son, "come down from heaven," as the Nicene Creed puts it. God's Son entering the world as an infant born to a poor peasant couple, wrapped in "swaddling clothes" and "laid in a manger" – this is a profound mystery indeed!

But deeper still, is the promise that God continues to come into our world. As people of faith, we believe Christ is alive still and seeks to be born again and dwell within each of our hearts. This is the mystery of Christmas – Emmanuel "God with us."

## Family of six is enjoying newest Habitat home

You've been asking these last many months of the pandemic about the status of the Apostles Build Habitat for Humanity project. The good news, and we need some good news, is that this year's Apostles Build home was recently completed, dedicated and occupied by a family of six.

The project, which should have been finished in the spring or early summer, ground to a halt for months as a result of the COVID pandemic's impact on construction workers and supplies. Harry Wakefield, Missions
Committee moderator, tracked
progress, or rather, lack of progress
of the build during the summer. It
seemed at times that it might never
be finished. But, through the Grace
of God. the generosity of the Kirk
and ten other local congregations,
construction was completed in
October, and the house became a
home.

The Apostle's Build typically occurs every other year. The next project is planned for 2022. According to Habitat staff, this was the 148th home constructed in

Garland County. For an Apostle's Build, each congregation contributes \$5,000. The Kirk's contribution was provided through Missions Committee funds.

Habitat for Humanity's mission statement is an important reminder of why we participate in the Apostle's Build. "Seeking to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities, and hope."

## Kirk worshipers should wear masks at all times

On Nov. 10, Gov. Asa Hutchinson conducted a briefing on safety measures used in houses of worship to prevent the spread of the coronavirus. He said it is possible to worship safely in-person if state guidelines for places of worship are followed.

The governor stressed the recommendation to use face coverings (masks) continuously throughout the worship service, even when singing.

We had a special Session meeting on Nov. 13 to determine how the Kirk would follow what the governor outlined. The Kirk was already following most of the guidelines, such as social distancing and wearing masks.

Distancing in the sanctuary has been set by placing bulletins six feet apart in every other pew. Couples can move the bulletins close together but still maintain the six-foot distance to the next bulletin. This has not changed from what we have been following since the Kirk reopened.

The Session voted to make one key change in the use of the masks.

In the past the congregation was asked to wear their mask into the Kirk but once in their seat, the mask could be removed. After discussion, it was decided to encourage all members to put their masks before they leave their car and keep them on until they return to their vehicle.

Masks should be kept on even when singing. Unmasked singing is a primary driver of transmission in churches even when spaced six feet apart. Singing produces aerosols that can increase the risk of virus transmission. The Clerk's Corner Jerral Johnson



Worship leaders or performers are exempt from wearing their mask while singing but should maintain a 12-foot social distancing.

When entering the Kirk, or when leaving at the end of the service, the six-foot distance between individuals should be maintained. One should maintain proper social distancing when in the narthex and breezeway.

It is our opinion following these precautions, we can maximize safety during worship.

#### **Entry into The Village Restrictions**

The Property Owners' Association is instituting a "proof of authorized entry" requirement for anyone entering the Village.

If you have someone coming in to make a presentation at a club, to visit the Kirk or as a visitor to your home, I suggest you read the Nov. 17 issue of the Village Voice. It has an article discussing how non-POA members can enter the Village. There is also a letter from the POA to the Kirk outlining the policy.

Your support makes stories like Michael and Michelle's possible.





## Paul Hayek played key role in U.S. Space program

Hot Springs Village Life magazine recently featured Kirk member Paul Hayek in an article about his career in the aeronautics industry.

Village Life is a quarterly publication produced by the Hot Springs Village Voice and is included with a subscription to the Voice. The article was written by Suzanne Sweeten, a correspondent for the Voice. Here are some highlights from the article:

Before he became a Villager, Paul Hayek helped make history. His career began with the Gemini program and ended with the space shuttle. In Paul's words, "I was a propulsion-system test engineer."

After college and serving in the military, Paul went to work for McDonnell Aircraft, which later became McDonnell Douglas.

"I got the chance to go on the Gemini Program." Gemini was a precursor to the Apollo missions. Gemini trained NASA and its astronauts for space travel. Without Gemini's practical experience, a man couldn't land on the moon.

Hayek's next assignment was the Space Station. When it was canceled, he was transferred to NASA's SKYLAB program. Next, he the F-4 Phantom II. "I helped worked on develop a new missile called a Boost-Reentry Vehicle." Glide Next. "I moved to the Harpoon Missile program, an anti-ship missile launched either by air or by ship." Hayek began working on the Space

Shuttle program in 1975. His team focused on the solid rocket boosters and the orbiter. After the Challenger incident, the team researched their documentation to see if they had anything to do with it. It was later determined it was not their error.

In summary, Hayek's teams helped mold space travel.

"The programs were all about change. The Mercury Capsule was to see if they could do it. With Gemini, we had to evolve to docking in space. The Apollo program used Gemini's information to do the lunar landing."

Paul retired in 1994 and moved to the Village in 1998. Paul and his wife, Joyce, have been active members of the Kirk ever since.

## Project Hope Food Bank's needs have doubled

Becky Chote smiled and greeted us warmly.

"You just missed some others who were here from your church – Harry and Becky Wakefield. So, come on in!" Becky said. She has an infectious smile, even with a mask on, and we felt immediately at home.

The Project Hope Food Bank (PHFB) in Hot Springs was a bustling place, with trucks delivering food products and forklifts buzzing and shuffling the incoming and outgoing pallets of food in a crowded warehouse.

The workers, just a few volunteers, were lifting and rearranging shelves and pallets, all with a purpose and a plan directed by Ted Thompson, the founder and executive director of PHFB, and Becky, its community awareness coordinator.

The pandemic's impact has been real and significant for PHFB.

Between 2019 and the projected end of this year, they expect to double their food output to the community. That includes backpacks to 13 school districts, distributions to 45 local food pantries, emergency food boxes to hospitals and social agencies, and feeding programs like Jackson House and the Salvation Army.

Hunger is real and seemingly omnipresent.

"I get about 20 phone calls a day from families looking for food," said Becky.

Of course, to double their output, they must double their input. That means more donations like those from the Kirk and other churches and more grants from foundations such as Walmart and Oaklawn.

It also means Becky and Ted must sharpen their pencils to get the best deals on the wholesale food market

"We convert 96 percent of every dollar we get into food purchases. We're in donated facilities, and we're all volunteers, so our overhead is minimal," said Becky.

She creates and runs spreadsheets using an algorithm comparing the impact of cost and nutritional value on their food purchases to ensure they are getting the best food value for their clients.

And, just like their much larger cousin, the Arkansas Food Bank, they pride themselves on their


ability to get the lowest prices and the biggest bang for their funds.

Becky's journey to PHFB may seem haphazard. She lost her job in the construction industry during the severe economic downturn in 2007-08. Trying to find work, she stumbled across the PHFB Ted Thompson was starting. She volunteered to help.

"He asked if I'd ever written a grant or created a website," she laughed. "I said no, but he gave me the job anyway, and I had to hit the ground running. I wrote my first

That was in 2008, and she's been there ever since. She loves her work and the fulfillment she gets from the results. "I wake up happy every morning and can't wait to get to work because of what we bring to the community and people in need."

In listening to Becky, I couldn't help think of a benediction I heard once: "You go nowhere by accident. Wherever you go, God is sending you. Wherever you are, God has put you there. Christ who indwells you has something He wants to do through you where you are. Now go in his peace, love, and power."

The Kirk's Second Mile campaign is not over. Winter will likely bring an even more severe infection rate than we have experienced to-date. More jobs will be lost and more families will be going hungry.
