Its primary goal is to remain aware of congregants' issues and provide physical, emotional and spiritual support to them, particularly those with special needs.

Programs under the umbrella of the committee are the following:

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### With Christ's help, we can live out our faith

I recently watched *The Pianist* and was reminded of this amazing story. This older movie is based on the true story of Polish concert pianist Wladyslaw Szpilman during World War II.

Szpilman was already an internationally recognized musician when Germany invaded Poland in September 1939. He was Jewish, forced into hiding and separated from his family.

His family members were eventually arrested and deported to the death camps. Szpilman spent most of the war as a fugitive, hiding in abandoned attics in houses throughout Warsaw.

Eventually Szpilman was discovered by a German army officer. But rather than turn him in, the officer befriended Szpilman. At great risk to himself, the officer continued to provide him with food, clothing and protection.

The movie version omits this officer's identity, but he was, in fact, Captain Wilm Hosenfeld. Hosenfeld's story and portions of his diary can be found in Szpilman's book, also entitled *The Pianist*.

Hosenfeld was a person of deep faith and often put that faith into practice. After the war it was revealed he had taken an active role in saving the lives of many Jews. He sometimes defied orders or took advantage of his position and

connections.

Once, when riding a bicycle near the Polish town of Pabiance, Hosenfeld encountered a young Jewish woman desperately running down the road. When asked where she was going, she could only stammer out that she was pregnant. Her husband had been taken to a local camp and she was going to

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the camp in hopes of getting him released.

Hosenfeld wrote down the husband's name and told the frightened young woman, "Return home. Your husband will be home in three days time." And indeed he was!

On another occasion, Hosenfeld learned the Gestapo had rounded up a number of men, including the brotherThe Pastor's Corner Bill Bailey



in-law of a priest who had been involved in the resistance. These men were being taken by truck to a work camp and the brother-in-law was to be executed.

The story is told that Hosenfeld spotted the truck moving through town, waved it down and told the S.S. commander he needed a man for a work detail. He picked the priest's brother-in-law as if by random selection. The man's life was spared.

After the war, Hosenfeld was captured by the Russians and eventually died in a Russian prisoner of war camp. Just before he died, he wrote in his diary, "Why did this war have to happen at all? We will not listen to the divine commandment, 'Love one another."

Today, Hosenfeld is remembered by many as a hero and a saint. There is a tree planted in his memory in

Israel on the Avenue of the Righteous.

It is an extraordinary story. I share it with you as a reminder. All of us are called to be faithful.

Whatever our life circumstances, we are all called to do what we can.

In ways large and small, as our life circumstances dictate, there come occasions for each of us to decide where our true loyalties lie. We must

choose which Lord we will obey.

Our lives may not be nearly as dramatic as Wilm Hosenfeld's, but we must still do what we can to honor Christ and live out our faith. May Christ strengthen us with wisdom and courage for the living of these days!

There was excitement in the air. We were ready to begin singing again.





ornate cathedral with the tomb of Columbus.


In Granada, you will enter elaborate summer palaces including the famous pink granite Alhambra and its lovely gardens.

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### Outreach is at the heart of care committee

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distributed on the second Tuesday of

each month to Kirk members on the house-bound or declining-health list who wish to receive one. Some 355 meals were distributed in 2018.

**Every Single Person (ESP):** This program pairs people living alone to contact each other daily by telephone.

**Prayer Tree:** Prayer requests are received by phone at the church, by phone or email to the Prayer Tree coordinator or by prayer request cards found in the pews in the church sanctuary and placed into the collection plates.

The requests are passed on to 23 members of the Prayer Tree, who each pray daily for those on the list.

**Cards to Ill Members:** Cards are sent to hospitalized members and those recovering at home from recent illnesses.

Thinking of You Cards: Cards from the Kirk

Konnection are signed by members of the congregation at both church services each week. The cards express our concern for Kirk members who are homebound, in a care facility or who are undergoing treatment.

**Visitation:** Area hospital and rehabilitation facilities are visited regularly by the Kirk staff, Care Committee and the Music Ministry.

#### **Prayer Shawl Ministry:**

Prayer shawls are made and donated by members of the congregation and given to members

who are ill, homebound or moving. Because so many shawls are made, many are donated to Arkansas Hospice and Dierksen Hospice.

**Wellness Program:** In the early stages of development, this program helps our members be aware



of how to remain healthy by offering Yoga and informational classes.

**Special Projects:** Last year's special projects included delivering Poinsettias to house-bound church members and sending Christmas cards to Kirk members who have relocated.

A special shout out goes to Janie Smith (Visitation Co-ordinator) who is an invaluable resource to the committee, providing a great deal of input regarding the needs of various church members.

If you have been the beneficiary of a Congregational Care Committee visit, meal, card, phone call, prayer shawl, prayer or class you know how appreciated and important the extension of hand and heart are to our individual and collective congregational health.

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### Easy way to begin journey to find spirituality

I was asked to fill in temporarily for Lowell Gardner writing Carnegie Corner while he is out of town dealing with pressing family matters.

It was a seemingly simple task of writing about how the church library can be a resource for our spiritual journey. But I'm not a reader of spirituality or theological topics. Fiction with a happily-ever-after ending is my preferred genre and singing in the choir is my "thing."

Then, after a fortuitous suggestion, I picked up Macrina Wiederkehr's book *A Tree Full of Angels: Seeing the Holy in the Ordinary*, and I could not put it down.

Macrina introduces herself as an ordinary person from Altus, Ark. She claims ordinary roots from a slightly dysfunctional yet loving family. The second home she claims is a Benedictine community – St. Scholastica Monastery in Fort Smith, Ark.

As a person with no claim to mystical heights, I could relate to her conversations about ordinary folks finding our extraordinary God in the ordinary things of life.



But her hard questions were far from ordinary. I found her reflections both refreshing and jolting at the same time. Macrina writes:

"We stand in the midst of nourishment and we starve. We dwell in the land of plenty, yet we persist in going hungry. Not only do we dwell in the land of plenty; we have the capacity to be filled with the utter fullness of God (Eph. 3: 16-19).

"In the light of such possibility, what happens? Why do we drag our hearts? Lock up our souls? Why do we limp? Why do we straddle the issues? Why do we live so feebly; so dimly? Why aren't we saints?"

Macrina continues with a personal invitation to each of us:

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### Perfect time of year to practice your putting

HEADS UP: To the Kirk Sunday Golf Group.

During the off-season, consider a few of the pointers I have read or heard of that may help you improve your game. Now I will see if I can follow them myself.

#### **Avoiding the Three-Putt:**

- 1. Always keep your hands even with or ahead of the putter on the follow through.
- 2. Read your line from behind the ball.
- 3. Take your stance, glance at the hole and the putter blade to see that it's square to your line.
- 4. Take two or three practice strokes, concentrating on judging the distance. Then set the blade behind the ball and imitate your last practice stroke.



5. This system helps keep your mind on the stroke, not the importance of the putt. See you on one of our putting greens!

If you are new to our Kirk or looking for a friendly golf game, we welcome you. Our Kirk Sunday Golf Group is a group of single and couple golfers of all skill levels playing either 9 or 18 holes. It is your choice.
