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The Spirit can come silently and unnoticed

Happy Easter! Although it's now late May, this greeting is still appropriate for the Christian church!

Our Christian calendar and lectionary remind us Easter is more than simply one day in the year. In fact, Easter day marks the beginning of an entire season – the Great Fifty Days, concluding with the Day of Pentecost.

This day happens to be June 9 this year, two weeks after Memorial Day. Pentecost is the last day of the Easter festival, bringing together events of the Resurrection of our Lord and the Holy Spirit's empowerment of the church as told in the Book of Acts.

We recall Pentecost as the amazing way in which the Spirit of God descended on the first disciples of Christ, giving them the confidence and faith to witness in his name and preach the good news.

The Holy Spirit is God's gift to the church. It is a reminder that Christ is a living presence in our lives. As the author Brian Wren says in his 2012 hymn, *Christ Is Risen, Christ Is Alive:*

"Christ is alive! No longer bound to distant years in Palestine,

"But saving, healing, here and now, and touching every place and time."

Though some Presbyterians get nervous when people speak about the Spirit, and especially when they claim to get "the gifts of the Spirit," Pentecost does not The Pastor's Corner

always have to be followed by dramatic, supernatural gifts.

Theologian Emil Brunner once observed:

"The Spirit does not always have to be flames of fire and speaking in tongues. Sometimes the Spirit comes silently and unnoticed. Quite softly, the door to God can open, and when it opens, God's light flows in without a sound and yet powerfully.

"Peace with God – that is, the first opening of the door; joy in God – that means that it has opened wide so that, as the poet says, 'your room becomes full of sun.'

"And this opening of the door to God is indeed what alone matters in life."

Again, Happy Easter, and Happy Pentecost! May our Lord richly bless you in this season, filling you with joy and peace and all God's gifts of the Spirit.

If you have not been by to see the project in progress, I would suggest that you take time to follow its development.


This is a busy time of the year for Kirk members with the many activities planned by the committees. Take time to be a part of them.

Megan received the first Top of the Rock Peggy Gram Scholarship and has been a contributor in several venues at











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Texas educators are newest Kirk members

At the encouragement of mutual friends, John and Marty Davis met on a blind date 25 years ago in Kemah, Texas. They had a picnic lunch, then went fishing on the *Judy Beth* fishing boat.

Their lives were never the same after that.

They were married in the Presbyterian church in Webster, Texas, on Jan. 29, 1994.

Marty was born in Niagara Falls, N.Y. She lived there until eighth grade when the family moved to the small town of Pekin, N.Y.

She spent her summers picking cherries, peaches and other wonderful fruits and vegetables. She played trombone in the Pekin Fire Dept. Marching Band.

After graduating from high school, Marty spent four memorable years at the State College of New York at Geneseo where she earned a bachelor's degree in English. She later earned a master's degree in education from the University of Rochester.

Marty married her college boyfriend and they had one son, Timothy. A few years later her husband got a teaching position at the University of Houston-Clear Lake in Texas. Marty taught English at Clear Lake High School and completed her counselor certification.

A few years later there was a divorce. Marty stayed in Clear Lake and continued her school counseling and Lay Ministry at Webster Presbyterian Church.

John was born in Kerrville, Texas. His family moved to Corpus Christi when he started third grade. In high school, John joined the Naval Reserves and, after graduation, served three years active duty in the Navy, including a year in Vietnam.

After being discharged, he attended Delmar Junior College in Corpus Christi and received a bachelor's degree in education from Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. He earned a master's degree in education from the University of Houston/Clear Lake.

During this time, John re-joined the Naval Reserves and retired with 26 years total service.

John has an adopted son, Mark, from a previous marriage. Mark lives in a group home in Lufkin, Texas. John visits him regularly. John still has family in Corpus Christi.

Marty has an adopted daughter, Susan. She is divorced and has been suffering with multiple sclerosis for many years. She lives in Tomball, Texas. Susan has one son, Joshua, who has been attending the University of Memphis for "many years" with considerable assistance from Grandma, she said. His goal in life is to become a college football coach.

We can be divided and still get along just fine

POLARITY was the key word in Professor Peg Falls-Corbitt's *Being* a Church in a Partisan Culture workshop May 15 in Hoffius Hall.

For her purposes she defined the key as "two values that appear to be opposite of, and in tension with each other, but in reality are interdependent [because] both are needed for the long-term health of an organization."

She led workshop attendees in practicing thoughtful and interactive

ways to discuss politically charged issues in an atmosphere which encourages empathy and develops an understanding for those who disagree with us.

In the course of the discussion, one participant stated "life is messy." In that context Falls-Corbitt acknowledges a life of faith is filled with polarities, both ethical and theological.

But, in His love, both have something God is calling you toward and, in presuming the value of both and of those who are drawn to each, we can find a way of building empathy (emotional care) and understanding (intellectual respect).

For any who missed the workshop, seek out someone who attended and discuss their experience with them. They may share with you a copy of the handouts they received.


Jackson House getting help from food Basket


The Book Club will meet from 9-10:30 a.m. on Wednesday from July 10 through Sept. 4 in the Kirk library to dissect and evaluate the concepts and conclusions of these two well-known writers.

Kidd wrote the bestselling novel *The Secret Life of Bees*. In *The Dance of the Dissident Daughter*, the author turns autobiographical as she describes her own often heart-rending struggle to find fulfillment as a contemporary Christian woman.

She referred to it as "her religion spirituality colliding into feminism." She arrived at what she came to refer to as "the sacred feminine." It can be enlightening to both male and female readers to evaluate how she does.

The Jesus I Never Knew or What's So Amazing About Grace, in our Kirk Library, are two of the many books from the mind and pen of Philip Yancey, a Christian editor and author.

Yancey writes three nagging questions plagued him



and he acknowledged at the outset "had no easy answer."

The questions are: Is God Unfair? Is God silent? Is God hidden? The opening five chapters outline the challenge.

every person on the planet has access to clean, reliable and affordable energy. Roughly one-quarter of the people on the globe still lack adequate electricity.


Solar's vision is to illumine our fellow human beings with hope and life through solar energy. SUS trains volunteers to design and install solar power in communities lacking reliable electric power.

He was well on his way in industry as Quality Assurance Director at a boat manufacturing facility, having served in other supervisory roles as well.

Nathaniel himself would likely be the last to predict he would ultimately be serving children and families at Vera Lloyd. One wonders if Nathaniel knew his name (Nathanael in Hebrew) means "God has given."

Working with several church youth groups might have sown the seeds. But what really made the difference was his wife's intervention when she convinced him they should become house parents at Vera Lloyd.

This set him on the course to serving God in this way. Yet Nathaniel was, to say the least, unsure.

After several years of being a virtual parent to abused, neglected and drug-addicted youth, Nathaniel acknowledged God was speaking clearly to him.

"The children needed him more than anyone," he realized.

Two children stand out in his mind. One was girl who overcame her addiction and is now a case manager for children in Kansas City. They stay in touch since they feel Nathaniel and his wife are "like parents" to them.

From these beginnings, and perhaps with his leadership experience in industry, Nathaniel progressed from House Supervisor to

Program Coordinator to Program Director to now serving as Site Director of the Monticello facility.

His leadership roles in the factory gave him the tools to deal with adults but it was the love of God that equipped him to be a counselor and parent to children in the house he shared with his wife.

In his time at Vera Lloyd, he has seen more than 1,000

children come through the doors and in his own words, their stories "make me heartsick."

As if all this service wasn't enough, Nathaniel has also used his gifts as a pastor of rural churches since before joining Vera Lloyd.

Nathaniel thanks God for an agency like Vera Lloyd which exists only to help children and families, unlike some who are "in the business" of providing social services.

It is interesting to reflect on Nathaniel's story. He may never have predicted he was to become God's gift to the children of Vera Lloyd, but he was uniquely prepared by God just for that.

Remember: It is our gifts to Vera Lloyd that support the work Nathaniel and others do to save and transform the lives of children and families in need.

Lenten soup and bread luncheons began on Ash Wednesday and continued through April 10.

The Annual Kirk Picnic was May 16 at the Balboa Pavilion. Hamburgers, hot dogs and brats were cooked by the skilled Kirk grillers with the Greenhorns providing delicious side dishes.

These activities are in the works:

- On July 24, the Education, Mission, and Fellowship committees will sponsor a pot-luck dinner. Chris McRae will speak on Solar Under the Sun.
- A Fish Fry in August or September catered by Riverside Catering is being considered.
- The second annual Chili Cook Off will probably be repeated in October.
- Other church-related receptions and suppers are also being planned.

The Fellowship Committee has three subcommittees:

The Shepherd Program promotes fellowship, provides community and instills caring relationships among Kirk members in smaller group settings.

The Head Shepherd divides the congregation into shepherd groups for two-year periods. The six groups usually plan monthly events to encourage camaraderie and friendship. Shepherd leaders arrange transportation and food in times of emergency.

In the event of a member's death, the group leader will arrange for the shepherd group to provide a meal for the family usually at the time of the funeral or memorial service. Presently, this flock is without a Head Shepherd.

The Memorial Reception subcommittee is led by Judy Rosenthal. It organizes receptions after memorial services or funerals at the Kirk. The leader co-ordinates with the bereaved family on the day of service to identify any special needs such as a screen on which to project a video and flowers.


