Aging congregation poses new challenges

Church membership in the United States has been declining over the last 60 or so years. This trend has accelerated recently, greatly due to increasing secularization of our society. Belonging to a church is no longer the norm it once was.

Declining membership is not unique to churches. Most organizations – from volunteers on committees in our Property Owners' Association to well-known civic groups and clubs – have fewer members every year.

While the Kirk is a strong community of faith, we have not avoided the membership trend. In the January issue of A Voice in the Pines, we noted the decline in the Kirk's membership over the last few years.

Surprisingly – and fortunately – the decline in membership has not seen a proportional decline in pledged giving.

In this article, we will endeavor to make clear where our congregation stands and where we might go.


The last decade

The Kirk began the most recent decade with 474 members in 299 households. We ended the 10 years with 271 members and 184 households. These

statistics are illustrated in the membership chart on the next page.

The reason our membership has been dropping is because we're part of an aging demographic. The

median age of residents in Hot Springs Village is 68.8, compared to 37.4 nationally.

Of late, 197 Kirk members have died, close to an average of 20 individuals each year.

Over the same period, 132 members left the congregation by transfer of membership. Examination of the transfers reveals most moved from the Village so they could live nearer to family.

In this same time frame, the Kirk gained 126 new members, approximately 12 each year. Clearly, losses and additions in our membership do not balance out.

Trends in giving

So what have we experienced vis-à-vis giving? With the decline in membership over the last





decade, the numerical number of pledges has decreased. What is truly remarkable, however, is the amount pledged and given by each member and household has increased over the decade (see the chart on giving on the next page).

Not only has giving increased, pledge completion has been over 96 percent. For every dollar pledged, 96 cents has been contributed.

As Pastor Bill Bailey puts it, “That is simply unheard of.”

We have said repeatedly, the Kirk is blessed by our faithful, dedicated, and giving membership. Truly outstanding!

The impact of these trends

The extraordinary generosity of our congregation allows us to offer a wide range of opportunities for worship, study, fellowship, and service. As we know, our church is known for its excellent preaching, teaching, music, mission work, and fellowship, all of which require financial support.

The 2022 Stewardship Campaign conducted by Cheryl Boehmke and her able team, was successful in every way. Yet, because our membership is declining the future may be at risk.

Inevitably, fewer givers will lead to challenges such as relying on cash reserves that will eventually be depleted.

So, what’s next?

It’s incumbent on us to grow our congregation so we might continue to serve our Lord in the ways we, as His disciples, seek.

And, it’s not just about the numbers.

There are sisters and brothers in the broader community who could benefit from being part of the Kirk, and who need the Lord in their lives. In addition to all we are doing, we are called to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ even more broadly with others.

And, we should acknowledge our ability to sustain ministries requires a sustainable cadre of servants.

How do we suggest achieving the necessary results?

First, the Session will gather a group to identify strategies for “getting the word” about the Kirk and its work out to the Hot Springs Village community. If you wish to join this effort, please contact Bob Morrow or Arnie Holtberg.

Second, Pastor Bailey will present a weekly series on how we can more boldly share our faith with others beginning at 9 a.m. Wednesday, April 20, in Hoffius Hall. Please mark your calendar and plan to attend these workshops.

As we emerge from or at least learn to cope with the pandemic, and as the Village continues to grow and flourish, we have an opportunity to counter existing societal trends and build our congregation.


Change in covid policy:




At their last meeting, the Session decided to relax the covid recommendations and voted to proceed with customary Lenten lunches.



Applications being accepted for \$2,600 Maack-Ormsbee scholarships

Applications for the 2022 Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines Maack-Ormsbee Scholarship (\$2,600 each) will be accepted through June 30.

The applicant must have proof of registration at an accredited state university or college, Presbyterian Church USA University, or an accredited trade school before the fall academic semester.

The Maack-Ormsbee Scholarship Fund was initially established with a contribution of \$30,000 by Kirk member Pat Ormsbee in honor of her late first husband Kenneth Maack. The fund is held at Texas Presbyterian Foundation.

The scholarship is administered by a subcommittee of the Kirk's Christian Education Committee.

Commune with nature and help beautify our lovely church grounds

Priscilla Hayek, Moderator of the Grounds/ Memorial Garden Committee at the Kirk, is gearing up for the beautification of the Memorial Garden and grounds once again. Priscilla and her committee have many needs and wishes, as well as bold plans for 2022

Committee members are Cheryl Boehmke, Tom Hayek, Rosalyn Halbert, Jerral Johnson, Mel Kuntz, Vicki Rosenquist, and Ted Sampsel. In addition, Priscilla has a dedicated cadre of garden gnomes: Dennis Faulk, Jim Adams, Barb and Daryl Henry, Chip Johnson, Judy Rosenthal, Jay Wilborn, and Bill Worthley.

Everyone meets from 10 a.m. to noon on the last Friday of each month.

Soon pre-spring maintenance will begin with applying Preen for weed control, removing leaves and other debris, pruning ornamental grasses, fertilizing camellias, and emptying, cleaning out, and refilling the Memorial Garden pond.

Several additional major projects are in the works.

The eight-foot staircase leading down to the Memorial Garden burial area, the iron railing leading down to the Columbarium, and some rotten wood expansion strips need replacing.

On the south side of the sanctuary, rotten railroad ties will be removed and the area will be refurbished with stone.

Unfortunately, due to a lack of irrigation, the shrubs which were removed last year due to ice damage cannot be replaced. However, the shrubs outside the church office will be. The area surrounding the wooden Kirk sign by the parking lot on Asturias will be spruced up.

As you know, the Kirk sits atop several wooded acres and ample lovely gardens, all of which require periodic attention.

Even though the Grounds Committee is probably the Kirk's largest, new volunteers are always welcome. If you sign on, you will be working with a most congenial and dedicated group of people while communing with nature.

Daffodils are starting to emerge, soon to be followed by early flowering quince and camellias. Priscilla urges us all to take the time to enjoy their beauty.

All invited to Ash Wednesday service on March 2

The season of Lent begins on March 2. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Great 40 Days – the 40 days (not counting Sundays) leading up to the celebration of Christ’s resurrection on Easter.

The word “Lent” is *not* found in the Bible but comes from an old English word that referred to the lengthening of days that occurs in the spring.

For the church, it was a season that focused on the preparation new believers received before their baptisms.

Catechumens would be instructed about the Christian faith – this would sometimes last several months, culminating in a baptismal service in the spring on Easter. This preparation time was eventually shortened to what we now call lent – “the great 40 days” leading up to Easter.

Over the years, the church has used this time to encourage all Christians to focus on the disciplines of prayer, repentance, and spiritual renewal. Some Christians try “to give something up” for Lent, while others seek to give additional service.

In our day, Lent continues to be a time of prayer and preparation when all of us are called to focus on what it means to be a Christian.

On Ash Wednesday, we will gather for our

traditional service of the “imposition of ashes.” We will all of us remember “we are dust” as we focus on our mortality.

We invite you to join us for this March 2 service as well as for the Lenten lunch of soup and bread that follows. As always, you are encouraged to invite a friend.

A.G.'s office gives low-down on scam artists

On a rainy Thursday morning, Feb. 17, a rapt audience of nearly 50 Kirk members and friends was educated and armed with information about scams.

Micah Warbington, the public affairs program liaison from the Arkansas attorney general's office, explained how to identify scams, avoid falling prey to scams, and how to report scams.

Hot Springs Village Chief of Police, Ricky Middleton took the time to attend this informative program and provided current information on the most recent scam incidents occurring in the Village.

Warbington presented an information-packed program along with a PowerPoint presentation introducing some of the more common scams, such as government-imposter scams, family emergency scams, utility payment scams, and online shopping scams.

A basic recommendation was to avoid answering unidentified phone calls. We should let those unknown calls go to voice mail. If it is a legitimate call, the caller will leave a voice-mail message.

Blocking calls is not an effective technique because it alerts the caller this is an active phone listing. Another suggestion was to turn off Wi-Fi and Location Services on our phones when not in use.

Warbington pointed out it is always a scam if they ask you to wire money or pay with a prepaid credit card or gift card. Never give out personal information such as your Social Security number, credit card information, driver's license number, or bank account number to someone who contacts you by email or phone.

There are several ways to report if you become a victim:

How to avoid scams

- Do not give your name, address, or other contact information to telemarketers.
- Never wire money based on an unsolicited phone call. Wiring money is like sending cash.
- Never agree to deposit a check from someone you don't know and then wire money back to that person.
- Never pay money to get money from a lottery or sweepstakes.
- Phone numbers on Caller ID can be deceptive.

- Call the Arkansas attorney general's office at 800 482-8982.

- Report the scam to the Village police department.
- For mail scams, send documentation to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service at P.O. Box 15058, Little Rock, AR 72231; call 877 876-2455; or go to postalinspectors.uspis.gov.

- If you are scammed via the Internet, report it to iC3.gov, a partnership between the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the National White Collar Crime Center.

- If you are the victim of wire fraud, contact MoneyGram at 800 666-3947 or

fraud@moneygram.com or Western Union at 800 448-1492.

Warbington answered questions about scam schemes those in the audience had encountered. He reminded us current information on scams and consumer alerts is available from the Arkansas Attorney General's Office. To subscribe go to www.arkansasag.gov. Click on the link that says Sign Up For Attorney General Alerts and enter email and requested information.

There have been several incidents reported in Hot Springs Village where a phone call was received asking for immediate funds to be wired to prevent the Police Department from citing you for some alleged violation.

At the same time, a bogus social services call request is made to the Police Department to drive by in a police vehicle and check on the address listed for that phone number.

Police Chief Ricky Middleton reminded us Village police officers will never ask for money.

The idea for the event was suggested by Kirk member Don Webb, who worked with AARP as a volunteer in scam education.


All Kirk women are invited to attend and are encouraged to bring a friend. If you have not made your reservation, contact your circle leader or call the church office.

By George Herbert (1593-1633)

Love bade me welcome: yet my soul drew back,
Guilty of dust and sin.

But quick-eyed Love, observing me grow slack
From my first entrance in,
Drew nearer to me, sweetly questioning
If I lacked anything.

"A guest," I answered, "worthy to be here":

Love said, "You shall be he."

"I, the unkind, ungrateful? Ah, my
dear,

I cannot look on thee."

Love took my hand, and smiling did
reply,

"Who made the eyes but I?"

"Truth, Lord; but I have marred them;
let my shame

Go where it doth deserve."

"And know you not," says Love, "who bore the blame?"

"My dear, then I will serve."

"You must sit down," says Love, "and taste my meat."
So I did sit and eat.

George Herbert, a contemporary of William Shakespeare and John Milton, was a highly influential poet, orator, and priest of the Church of England.

In this poem, one of a triptych, Herbert recalls Jesus' frequent use of banquet images and the communion meal. The sincerity of Herbert's remorse for sin and the tender compassionate response of Love (the Lord) make this one of Herbert's most moving poems.
