The Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines congregational community has wholeheartedly embraced the apostle Paul's recollection of Jesus' words through your overwhelming support of missions.

The Mission Committee takes the responsibility of allocating and distributing the gifts you have donated prayerfully and with a great sense of gratitude.

The committee is led by Moderator Judith Rosenthal and

has the following members: John Davis, Daryl Henry, Gloria Pickett, Helen

Van Stone, Ken Wolf, Bruce Dale, Richard McPheters, Jerral Johnson, Bob Morrow, Carol Clark, Norma Stevens, and Secretary Becky Wakefield.

Traditionally, 22 to 25 percent of the Kirk's annual budget is earmarked for mission work. Last year this money funded 27 different missions and was provided from

one or more of seven Sessionapproved fund accounts.

These are the Congregational Mission Fund, \$1.00 Mission Fund, the Endowment Fund, the Luke 12:48 Endowment Fund, the International Mission Fund, the Second Mile Giving Fund, and the Special Projects Fund.

you might like to know how your generous

gifts were distributed last year. Altogether, \$97,382 was distributed to missions and agencies traditionally supported by the Kirk. Ten received approximately 80 percent of these funds from one or more of the accounts listed above. These included Ferncliff. Vera

Lloyd Presbyterian Family Services, Samaritan Ministries, Ouachita Children's Home, Meals on Wheels, Jackson House, Arkansas Food Bank, Project Hope Food Bank, **Cooperative Christian Ministries** and Clinics, and Potter's Clay.

As in 2020, the committee continued its focus on food, shelter. and health through the Second Mile Initiative. Through this program, additional funds went to five agencies who serve these most basic needs.

Jackson House, Arkansas Food

Bank, Project Hope Food Bank, Cooperative Christian Ministries and

Clinics, and Potter's Clav received an equal share of \$30,399, of which \$17,522 was generously given by one donor in January 2021 as a match for funds received in 2020.

The remaining \$12,877 was given by others in 2021.

The committee recently decided to end the Second Mile

Because Christ is risen, we don't have to be afraid

Christ the Lord is Risen Today! Alleluia! With Christians all over the world, we will sing Wesley's wonderful hymn this coming April 17 – Easter Sunday. This hymn reflects the joy and hope all Christians hold dear – that sin and death do not have the last word and that the power of death cannot keep Christ, or us, in the grave.

This is certainly good news worth celebrating.

The Gospel of Mark tells us, however, that at the tomb of Jesus on that first Easter morning, the witnesses were "seized with fear and amazement and they said nothing to anyone for they were afraid!" (*Mark 16:8*)

While some versions of Mark continue on for another 12 verses, most scholars believe Mark intended his Gospel to end with fear and silence.

Why would Mark want such a strange ending to his Gospel?

No doubt this ending bothered others through the years. The editors of the NRSV and NIV Bibles add footnotes indicating verses 9-20 were most likely later additions by some scribes who felt Mark's Gospel needed a stronger ending. The other Gospels have resurrection appearances by Jesus, why not Mark?

But most scholars now agree *Mark 16:8* is the ending the Gospel writer originally intended for this Gospel – an ending not of celebration, but a mystery. Fear and silence are an appropriate response because they only encounter an empty tomb and a stranger's promise that Christ will see them in Galilee.

Remember, these first disciples must still ask the difficult questions about their own safety. If the cross is



God's way in the world, what next will be asked of them?

Small wonder these first disciples were silent and afraid. They knew, all too well, that the God who raised Jesus is the same God who calls us all to follow. Discipleship is a risky venture.

This Easter, you and I will again celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. We will join Christians all over the world in singing and witnessing to God's mighty works. While we are relatively safe here in Hot Springs Village, we should remember there are still places where our brothers and sisters pay dearly because of their faith.

We should also remember there may be times when we, too, are called to a costly discipleship. Christ still calls us to follow, obey and risk our lives in this needy world.

Christ is risen, indeed, and because He is, you and I do not have to be afraid of risking our lives and reputations.

Initiative since the impact of the pandemic on these agencies has diminished as has contributions to the initiative. However, all five will continue to receive support through other budgeted funds.

And what about the dollars for missions collected in the offering plate each Sunday?

These \$1 Mission funds totaled \$2,240 and went in equal amounts to Lyon College, The University of the Ozarks, Frontier Fellowship, the Presbyterian Church USA, West End Presbyterian Church, Ferncliff, Vera Lloyd, and Medical Benevolence Foundation.

International Fund dollars (totaling \$4,000) went to Haiti Educational Foundation, Heifer International, Solar Under the Sun, and Living Waters of the World.

The remaining budgeted funds went to a variety of missions and agencies including Small Group Therapy, SOZO, the Webb Center, Adult Teen Challenge, and hurricane disaster assistance. Every dollar allocated to missions was spent!

All 27 recipients of your gifts expressed heartfelt gratitude for your loving generosity. And especially, all of us who serve on the Mission Committee are deeply grateful to be able to faithfully share the love of Christ expressed through your gifts with the agencies in our community and beyond that aid "the least among us."

Priscilla Hayek, Moderator of the Memorial Garden and Grounds committee, says work will soon begin on the handrail on the sloping section of the sidewalk.








Pilgrimage Weekends are filled with fun, singing, laughter and communion with fellow Christian "seekers."

Symbolism important in Tenebrae service April 14

Tenebrae means "shadows" or "darkness" in Latin. Tenebrae church services have been held since the Middle Ages, first by the Roman Catholic church then, after the reformation, by protestant denominations.

The traditional service involves gospel readings (usually six or more) from the Passion of Christ as well as music, and in some cases, even the reading of poetry. Following each section of the service, a candle is extinguished.

When the last candle is extinguished, the church is in darkness.

Darkness falling progressively on the church can be understood to signify the darkness falling on the world as Jesus proceeds toward the cross and death.

The service helps focus worshipers on the reality of Jesus' agony as he neared the place where he would be tortured and killed by crucifixion. Each section of the service can be viewed as the falling of one shadow after another across the path of Jesus and on all creation.

Tenebrae services are held variously on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday. This year our traditional Maundy Thursday worship will be a Tenebrae service.

The gospel readings will be from the *Gospel of Luke*, chapters 22 and 23.


The service will begin at 5:30 p.m. April 14, so it will not be literally dark at the end of the service. However, for us, extinguishing candles symbolizes "the light," which is Christ, leaving the world just as during Advent and Christmas the lighting of candles symbolizes "the light coming into the world."

Maundy means "command" and is taken from the *Gospel of John* where, after washing the disciple's feet and the prediction of betrayal by Judas, he gives a new commandment:

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples if you love one another." (*John 13:34-35, NIV*)

Come, reflect, and remember Christ's sacrificial love experienced through this ancient service of remembrance.

Ultimate gift: wrapping your head around the truth

Zig Ziglar, the late professed Christian businessman, salesman, lecturer, and motivational speaker, was noted for declaring, "If you aim at nothing you will hit it every time," a cagey point to the need for clear focus and clarity of objective.

A thoughtful life seeks to understand the purpose for being and pursue a way to fulfill that purpose. This

means confronting questions regarding wisdom, honesty, courage, and strength, thereby achieving understanding, uprightness, endurance, and potency.



Identify the way and reach for it!

There will be and are many challenges and potential pitfalls along the way. There are occasions when everyone must pick themselves up, dust themselves off and go again.

But what of grievous, seemingly unredeemable wrongs? He or she has a moment similar to the author of the New Testament Letter to the Romans:

It is at this back to the drawing board moment one is, by beg or barter, returned to the creator only to discover the originator of purpose itself anticipating the call.

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life. For God did not send the Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world might be saved through Him." (John 3:16-17)

The ultimate challenge is to wrap one's head (or heart) around the truth – it's a gift!

"For by grace you have been saved through faith, that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as the result of works, so that no one may boast." *(Ephesians* 2:8-9)
