Winter weather strikes the Kirk, again

"We had a Christmas surprise on Christmas Eve" was the way Pastor Bill Bailey summed the situation up. "We thought we were prepared but it looks like we weren't."

After the catastrophic broken-pipes water damage sustained in February 2021, Kirk leadership took the precaution of turning off the water in the Kirk building during the most-recent "bomb cyclone" winter storm.

Anticipating single-digit temperatures and uncertain precipitation, we notified the congregation water would be turned off from Wednesday to Saturday before the Christmas Eve service.

When the water was turned on Saturday afternoon, a leak was discovered immediately coming from the ceiling in the storage room across from the Kirk office, and penetrating through a light fixture.

The water was turned off quickly and damage was confined to a few wet boxes.

With no water, and, coincidentally, inadequate heating in the Sanctuary, services had to be cancelled on two of the most important days in the church calendar.

Plumber David Johnson, working with our sexton Chip Johnson (no relation), identified the leak quickly enough on Monday, Jan. 26. A split occurred in one of the pipes in the ceiling of the office over the storage room.

This area had not been involved in the water event in 2021. Interestingly, the water penetration into the storage room was a good 8 feet away from the split and likely was the result of the water creating a "fountain," as Chip described it. The pipe was repaired in short order and water service was restored.

Precautions taken by Kirk staff, while not preventing

the rupture, clearly reduced the damage since all hands were on deck when the water was turned on.

Keep in mind there is a single water valve for the entire building located near Asturias Drive.
Unfortunately, pipes in the area over the storeroom were not insulated.

Unlike in 2021, when power was lost and therefore heat in the office was lost as well, power remained on as did the heat this time around. But single-digit

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Christmas for Christians continues until Jan. 6

Many of you know this already. On the Christian calendar, Christmas is not just one day. Instead, Christmas is a season lasting 12 days. Dec. 25 is Christmas, and so are the days following all the way until Jan. 6. Of course, we all remember the traditional English song, *The Twelve Days of Christmas*.



Jan. 6, for Christians in the west, marks the end of Christmas and the celebration of Epiphany – one of the important dates in our liturgical calendar.

Epiphany marks the visit of the three "wise men" who brought gifts for the king. We know, of course, they

were not kings, they were not "wise men," and we really do not know how many of them came. We assume there were only three because the Gospel writer, Matthew, tells us about three gifts.

Matthew calls them Magi. You may recognize this Persian word as the root of our English word "magician," which might give us a hint of meaning.

The best scholarly guess is they were probably educated, perhaps religious astrologers. They claimed to interpret dreams and stars, and if Matthew has it right, they claimed they followed some sort of star – first to Jerusalem and then to Bethlehem.

What makes the Magi especially important in

Matthew's Gospel is their ethnicity. They are gentiles, not Jews. And they come bearing gifts for a newborn Jewish King – something Herod was not able to do. They recognized Jesus' royalty with gifts, even when others, like Herod, cannot.

The Magi reflect one of the great themes of the Bible: that gentiles are somehow capable of responding to God's work in the world.

Acting on the signs and wonders in nature, they eventually make their way and acknowledge Jesus is Israel's true king. Their act of "paying homage" reminds us that Jesus's ministry will someday embrace all nations.

The Magi represent all of us "outsiders" who now find ourselves worshiping Israel's king. They are a reminder that in contrast to the violent kingdom of Herod, there is another peaceable kingdom that we are called to follow.

Emmanuel – "God with us" in all of life – is good news for all the world. This is good news for a New Year!

4 degrees cancels Kirk's Christmas services

temperatures and uninsulated pipes were likely to blame for this pipe freezing and rupturing.

Bill Worthley, Moderator of the Building Committee, is already at work planning for adding insulation to the pipes in the ceiling, at least those that have not been insulated. Bill also plans to explore adding independent water shut offs for the office building and the sanctuary so a water leak in the office building won't interfere with programs in the sanctuary.

As if this wasn't enough, heating in the sanctuary was inadequate to raise the sanctuary temperature above 50 degrees on Christmas Eve.

After consulting with our HVAC contractor Worthley

explained, "With a heat pump system at extremely low temperatures, the system has to rely on auxiliary or emergency electric elements to heat the air."

Bill and the contractor had set the system to use the emergency electrical option on Friday. But, even at this maximal setting the system was not able to raise temperatures in the sanctuary above 50 degrees with external temperatures dropping to 4 degrees.

We are told this extreme arctic wave was a rare event. Hopefully, with the steps we will take to prevent further problems, these factors won't coincide again on one of the two most significant times of the year for the Kirk.


Administration Committee: Tony Booth said annual performance reviews for staff have been completed. He thanked all those who volunteered their time in the evaluation process.



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Candidates named for Session Moderators

Traditionally, the governing body of a Presbyterian Church is made up of "elders." The word elder is derived from the Greek word *presbuteros*, meaning "old person," to imply maturity and wisdom. From this we derive the name Presbyterian.

There are two types of elders, the teaching elder and the ruling elder. The names indicate the areas of responsibility and training.

The teaching elder identifies those with the insight and training to lead the church in the understanding and interpretation of the Bible, the Word of God. They are also versed in the history and traditions of Presbyterian beliefs, its doctrines.

Bill Bailey is the Kirk's teaching elder, as has been Don Trent, Mike Seitz and Sam Pope, in recent memory. Bill is also designated Minister of Word and Sacrament.

Ruling elders are those who guide the church in all other aspects of its mission or ministries. This can cover caring for the sick and elderly, maintaining its properties, hiring and guiding staff, supporting various missionary endeavors, and production of a newsletter, to name a few. At the Kirk, these are individuals nominated and elected from the local membership.

All elders are ordained, that is, set apart by the Spirit of God to do God's work. The teaching elders are ordained by the Presbytery or "elders," as it were, of the greater body, in our case, the Presbyterian Church, USA or its local affiliate,

Presbytery of Arkansas. The ruling elders are ordained by the local church.

Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines is governed by 12 elders, including Clerk of Session. Each elder is assigned an area of responsibility and are called Moderators of that area. They meet monthly as a body referred to as a Session or in Session.

In this issue you will find articles introducing you to the four candidates for the Session – Ben Meek for Moderator of Member Outreach, Sharon Gardner for Moderator of Finance, Pat Kuntz for Moderator of Fellowship, and Dave Hamilton for Moderator of Administration.

An election for these candidates will be Jan. 8 following Sunday morning worship. The new Moderators will be installed at a later date.

They joined the Kirk in 2008. What a huge blessing this was for our congregation.

Sharon joined the Finance Committee shortly after joining the Kirk. She was installed as Moderator in the class of 2016. Charles Reece was installed as moderator in 2017 and served one year before moving away. Sharon served out his term in 2018-19.

Sharon's had a unique road in her work career which prepared her for financial leadership.


At the Kirk, Dave has served as Elder and Moderator of what was then the Evangelism Committee. He's also served on the Stewardship Committee.



Recovery for Mike Seitz is in sight


Finally, I write a thank-you to those who have held me faithfully in prayer, written and called encouragements to me and brought in meals.
